

HOW DO YOU STUDY SMARTER?

Rewrite your notes by hand.

Go old school and rewrite your notes by hand. Studies show that when you take the time to rewrite them by hand, you learn more effectively than when using your computer, tablet or laptop.

Listen to music.

Choosing the right type of music to listen to while studying can enhance your productivity, motivation and focus levels. Certain genres of music are recommended for studying – known as “music for the mind.” Study music should enhance concentration, focus and allow you to work for longer periods. It should never be counterproductive or distracting – no matter what genre you decide on.

Make a cheat sheet you'll never use.

Though you'll obviously never use a cheat sheet during an actual exam or quiz, it can help to create one because in order to do so, you'll need to sift through all of your notes and materials to find the key items and rewrite them on your sheet. Doing so helps you recognize what you need to learn and rewriting what you need to learn helps you remember it.


